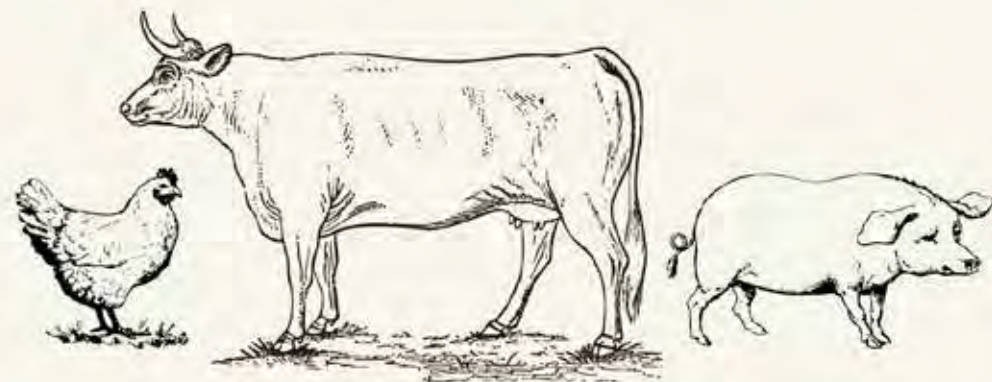

SUPPORTING OUR COMMUNITY

Visit by Dean Harriss, Member for Huon

Recently, BICA hosted a visit from Legislative Councillor and Member for Huon, The Hon Dean Harriss MLC. Dean has a particular passion for the area having been born and bred in the Huon region and is the son of long-serving member of Parliament – the late Paul Harriss.

Dean's visit enabled him to see firsthand the challenges faced by Bruny – and also bore witness to some successes. The issues discussed included the ferry, road safety issues, increased rubbish collection, planning and dealings with Kingborough Council, and the establishment of the part at Mills Reef.

Over an informal lunch, Graham Carter spoke about the increased traffic on Lighthouse Road and the challenges this created for residents regarding dust and the resultant health concerns. It was expressed to Dean that if the government was committed to improving facilities at Cape Bruny lighthouse, then there were other ancillary projects that needed to be addressed as this increased capacity only amplified the dust and traffic issues – not to mention the increased visitation and the rubbish issues! Graham made the comment that he had calculated it would only cost around \$80,000 to carpet the sections of the road that needed to be sealed! (thanks Graham!)

Dean dropped by the Lampkins camping ground and met with John Lampkin, Trevor Adams OAM and Victoria Bull.



Victoria was able to speak to Dean regarding the current medical responses and the need for the return of an All Terrain Ambulance (which was removed from the Island last year), and the confirmation of the second on-call nurse. These two issues are of serious concern to BICA and must be addressed without further delay.

Dean was also briefed by Trevor, Chair of the Ferry Reference Group, regarding the status of the re-development and implementation of infrastructure, while John Lampkin explained the challenges he has encountered while trying to improve and provide camping facilities at his Great Bay property.

Whilst it was a short visit, it was highly productive and BICA welcomes visits from our elected political representatives to keep abreast of Bruny issues at any time.

New Cyber-Security Awareness Campaign launches

With cyber-crime on the rise, last week the Tasmanian Government launched the Defend your data awareness campaign.

The campaign is aimed at encouraging all Tasmanians to defend their data as cyber threats from criminals become more frequent and more sophisticated.

Whether at home or in our workplaces, our reliance on technology is increasing, making us all potential targets for cyber-crime. Recent high profile cyberattacks have shown that even being a client (or former client) of an organisation can put us at risk.

Key to the campaign is raising awareness of how to detect a scam, what you can do to protect yourself online and knowledge of what to do if you are the victim of a scam.

A new website **defendyourdata.tas.gov.au** has been established to provide information on how to defend your data. The site contains three videos to explain how you can screen for scams, shield yourself and be ready to react if you need to.

Anyone can be vulnerable to a scam, so it is timely that everyone refreshes their knowledge of best practice data protection both at home and at work.

Screen for scams

- Be wary of unexpected contact, even from someone you know.

- Be cautious of communication that demands you to act quickly or provide personal information.
- If you feel unsure about a message, don't send a reply, open attachments, or click on any links.

Shield yourself

- Regularly update the apps and software on your devices.
- Never use the same password more than once. Make them unpredictable, unique, and long.
- Set-up two-factor or multi-factor authentication whenever possible.
- Immediately close any website your browser identifies as unsafe.

Be ready to react

- Block all further contact from the scammer.
- Contact your bank if money is involved and inform them of what happened.
- Report the scam.
- Seek support from family and friends to get yourself back on track.

Look out for the campaign on commercial television, radio, press and on social media. Visit **defendyourdata.tas.gov.au** to discover more on how to defend your data.

The Grasstree and Bushfire

The humble Grasstree has been around, evolving in some form since ancient times, thereby highlighting its bushfire resistance. They are well known for their characteristic black trunk colouring, a residue of bushfire survival. How do they do it?

Well, firstly they do not all survive. The infants (the ones without established above ground trunks) are the ones most at risk. An essential difference between our Bruny Grasstrees (*Xanthorrhoea australis*) and other native trees and bushes is their supply of hydration and nutrition. *Xanthorrhoeas* derive their food and water from internal vessels, whereas most other native plants have these vital supplies arrive through vessels in their external coating, the living component of their main trunk and branches. Another crucial difference with *Xanthorrhoeas* lies in their foliage; other trees and bushes have foliage widely spread over multiple branch terminals, whereas the Grasstree has its live foliage emerge exclusively through the top segment of its trunk, often referred to as the crown. As the plant ages and is spared local bushfire its emerging fresh foliage dies and dries off, thus serving paradoxically as a fire accelerant when torched. But because the external covering of the trunk is already dead and, for those individuals having experienced a fire, a fire-resistant charcoal (hence the blackness), the plant can sacrifice its green foliage, keeping alive its vascular core, ready for fresh emergence following the exit of the fire.

You will notice that more established and taller individual plants have tortuous trunks (a number of substantial alterations in direction of growth). A theory has been presented that these represent the plant survival of multiple bushfires; each change of direction



a separate fire. See the image (top) of a 3 metre individual of some 300 years old, compared with the younger individual approximately 80 years old with a well-developed dried 'skirt', indicating a long period without exposure to bushfire. Following bushfire, a Grasstree-rich forest will sprout a large collection of flower stalks. North Bruny, our Bruny Grasstree zone, has not experienced a major bushfire since the early 1980s, but we have witnessed many flowering plants between then and now, so bushfire is not the sole trigger to flowering.

State Government

For Kingborough Region and Huon Valley:

- Completion of the Kingborough Child Family Learning Centre (CFLC) as part of the \$28 million investment for six new CFLCs.
- \$52.5 million towards the \$60 million Algonia Road Interchange and duplication of the Kingston Bypass.
- \$21.7 million towards the Channel Highway Bypass of Huonville.
- \$4.7 million towards the \$5 million road safety upgrades to the Cygnet township.
- \$5.5 million for a new slip lane at the Huntingfield roundabout.
- \$600,000 to progress regional aero medical infrastructure, including helipads at St Helens and Dover.
- \$11.36 million towards a \$129.8 million program of upgrades to Southern region roads.
- \$21.7 million to the Channel Highway bypass of Huonville (Huon Link Road).
- \$2.59 million to support the Bruny Island ferry service.
- \$1.565 million for the continuation of the Cape Bruny project to improve vehicle access and car parking facilities with upgrades to day use areas.
- \$3.15 million to support Stage 2 of the Cockle Creek Gateway project, which will deliver a road realignment.
- \$30 million for the next stage of the Kingston Health Centre.

BICA is seeking further details on the budget allocations to Bruny Island and will provide a report once this information is provided.

Deep Ecology on Bruny

On two weekends in February, Deep Ecology workshops were held near Allonah, led by John Seed the founder / director of the Australian Rainforest Information Centres. John is a guide, teacher, author and poet, who at the active age of 77 continues to forge paths for environmental care and protection here in Australia and throughout the world. These were inspirational and heartfelt events, who's impact may well be felt on Bruny for years.

John, accompanied by First Nations elder Kris Schaffer, and co-facilitators, Liz Downes and Ronny Hickel, shared simple insightful introductions, meditations and contemplations. Explorations included movement from ancient traditions, story telling, self inquiry, creative art and narrative dialogue.



Participants included scientists, researchers, psychologists, teachers of various traditions, art therapists, United Nations peace representatives, social welfare workers, specialised educators, and environmental activists. There were parents and their young adult offspring.

Attendees came from many directions throughout Tasmania, Australia and as far away as Santa Barbara in California. Many have been inspired to serve humanity with intentional and earthly custodianship. In all 79 people and 3 interactive dogs attended.



Deep Ecology invites and welcomes big questions. Do we humans really care about the earth's resources and how they are utilised? Do we understand what **impacts our actions** have on our greater extended earth family and other species? How do we **remember to take care** of each other and all living species? Earth is our one and only home, yet 20% of our world's population are homeless. Many Australians have become homeless throughout the last year due to climate change and environmental impacts. Every day hundreds of species are becoming extinct. Do we wish to explore, or understand our personal responsibility? Participants were welcomed to share their griefs, sorrows and concerns openly in a trusted environment.

What do you have gratitude for and what are your concerns?

As thirty-five 18–77 year olds sat together in circle, exploring their collective and personal experience in the world, their contributions brought forward profound and challenging moments for the group. Each participant was invited to engage in various exercises which required heartfelt speaking and listening. To hear the wisdoms and receive knowledge from each other. We heard of the tragedies and the resilience of thousands of Australians affected by the severe weather changes through floods, fires and the consequences of various forms of mining, and industrial farming, damaging the fabric of this land and ocean beds. Others spoke of industrial piracy which showed no apparent regard towards the geographical areas in which they were situated.

Researchers in our group, gave accounts of events in Northern Territory and the Amazon regions of South America. Insightful information about local environmental areas of concern, such as the Tarkine, the Styx and Salmon industries was also shared.

Opportunities for new development projects, bringing solutions with good environmental outcomes were discussed along with the growth of new communities aligning with ethical companies to develop social enterprises making conscious choices for future generations still to come.

Our natural environment is being increasingly recognised as sentient. Environmental activists and researchers play vital roles in protecting our earth, by looking at environmental issues as important, for sustaining development and enhancing human and other species lives. History of the Bruny History Room

Bruny History room

Many of the institutions which came to use the building operated well before its construction. In the early 20th Century most municipalities in Tasmania had their own Court of Petty Sessions. Bruny's began at Alonnah in 1908. It was presided over by 2 Justices or a Magistrate. It dealt with more minor offences such as drunkenness, offences against property, offences against Education Laws and the unlawful use of animals.

Some early cases included Dennis Lockley damaging Mr Gray's door at Adventure Bay. He was fined 14 shillings (the cost of a new door) and 7/6 court costs. William Wisby was fined £2/10/- for disturbing the peace and H Barker 5/- for letting his horse wander a public road at Ford Bay.

The layout of the building was somewhat different to the present. Obviously there was no Post Office so where the door to the Post Office is now was the dock.

The History Room still contains several items from the courthouse such as the Bible for swearing in. In December 1942 it was resolved to establish a Free Municipal Library at the Council Chambers.



Bruny was declared a Municipality on August 27, 1907. Road Districts had elected trustees and levied rates on property values for the maintenance of roads. Elections were held in December for the wards of Lunawanna, Adventure Bay and Lennon. The Honourable Stafford Bird was elected for Lunawanna and became the first Warden of Bruny. He was also a sitting member of the Tasmanian Parliament. Consequently the History Room contains photos of all the wardens and much of the furniture from this time.

The building itself was erected by 1938 and in use almost immediately. It was constructed by Maurice Dillon with local labour and supplies. It was right next door to the Police Station in the centre of the administrative services.

The Court of Petty Session was transferred to Hobart in the 1970s and became the Magistrate's Court on February 1, 1986 but records of the cases held are in the History Room.

The Bruny Council sat until it was absorbed by the Kingborough Council (after much opposition) in 1993. Kingborough currently own the building but let the Bruny History Society have the use of it. The History Society started in 1988 and moved in in 1997. By this stage the building had been repainted.

Fortunately it was decided this year that a repaint was due so after some research into the records to find the original colours this was done by Craig Luke.

The building now reflects the original colours it was painted in. The building is used as the logo (see left) of the History Room.

Book Review

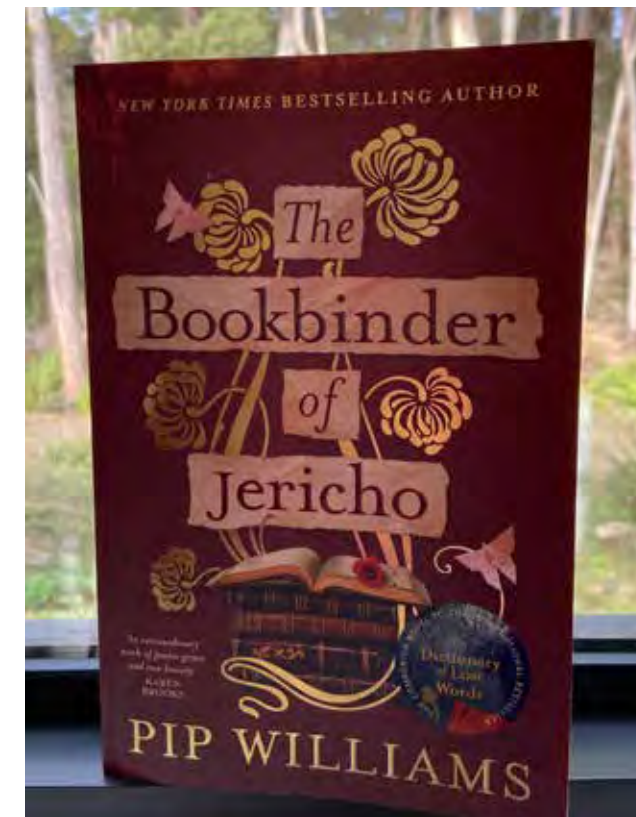

The Bookbinder of Jericho — everyone in my book club loved this book. This doesn't happen often. It is a companion book to Pip William's first novel, *The Dictionary of Lost Words*. There are crossovers between the two books but they each are a stand alone read.

It is 1914 and war is announced. Peggy and Maude have very different reactions to this event. They might be twin sisters but they are different personalities with a very different view of the world. Maude worries about the changes war will bring and Peggy longs for them. She longs for so much more than her working class life can offer her. She watches wealthy young women enter the gates of Somerville College at Oxford University and wants the opportunities they have. Peggy's frustration at the restrictions of her class and gender is told through her relationship with Gwen, a student at Somerville. Peggy works at the Oxford University Press, folding, gathering and sewing books. The description of this process is like a love letter to books and sends you to YouTube clips to watch how this is done, including one by Pip herself. But Peggy wants to read the books, not bind them, and we agonise with her as she struggles to realise her dream.

The book is told in 5 parts spanning the war years, 1914–18. We experience war through the women's eyes. War took the men away and the women had to hold life at home together as their families were torn apart. Belgian refugees arrived and with them the realities of the destruction and displacement inflicted by war. Their story is told by Lotte and Bastiaan who become part of Peggy and Maude's life in Jericho. Life on the Western Front is communicated in letters to Peg from her mother's friend, Tilda. Tilda joined up as a VAD and nursed at the 24th General Hospital near Etaples. Another nurse here is Vera Brittain



whose novel, 'Testament of Youth', is her personal heartbreaking story of life, love and loss during the war years. Her fight to attend Oxford University is overshadowed by the fight her brother and fiancé are part of in France. The shocking deaths of the soldiers is felt by all at home and then death comes to home in the form of the Spanish Flu.

The Bookbinder is a well researched and beautifully written book about women, about how the war changed women's lives. It is a book about war: its horrors, its impact. It is a book about love: love for family, love for ideas and knowledge, and love for books!

My daughter was working with Pip Williams and told her how popular *The Dictionary of Lost Words* was amongst borrowers from the Bruny Island Community Library. I predict *Bookbinders* will be just as popular. Borrow it from the library Thursday or Saturday afternoons between 1–4pm.

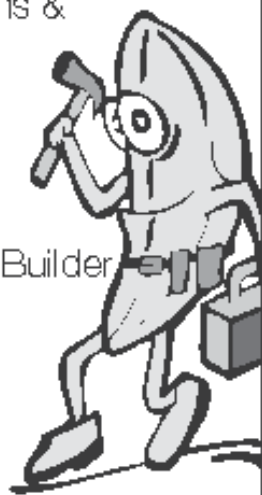

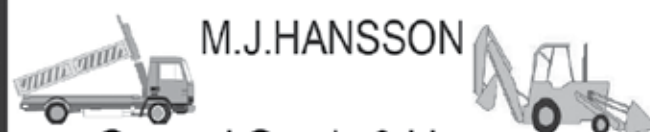
